### If you CHOSE THIS:

Never underestimate the strength of an insect! Like ANT-MAN, who can shrink in size while increasing in strength, the RHINOCEROS BEETLE packs a punch. Growing up to six inches (15 cm) long, the beetle gets its name from the rhinolike horn on the male's head, but it also matches its namesake in brawn. It is able to lift 850 TIMES its own body weight—that would be the same as a human lifting NINE ELEPHANTS! That power comes in handy for the rhinoceros beetle when it has to escape predators. The beetle uses its horn as a shovel to quickly dig a hole in the dirt or to lift up DEBRIS from the forest floor and then hide underneath it.

### If you CHOSE THAT:

COSMIC RADIATION is what gave the Thing—of the Fantastic Four—his

TURTLE doesn't use its spiky shell and armored snakelike head to fight evil, but rather to blend in. The mata mata is camouflaged by leaves at the bottom of the shallow waters of SOUTH AMERICA, where it ambushes fish and invertebrates that pass by with its long, bumpy neck and vacuum-like mouth. But don't let the mata mata's tough side scare you—this turtle isn't dangerous to humans. In fact, it is quite sensitive to water quality and is easily harmed by pollutants.

#### Choice Nugget

Besides digging, the rhinoceros beetle uses its horn to fight off other males from encroaching on its feeding site. The size of the horn can be up to two-thirds of the beetle's body length.

Wait and see. Sticky situation.



Ready, aim, lunch! Like Hawkeye—of the Avengers—the ARCHERFISH has excellent reflexes. Instead of releasing an arrow, this fish fires a water cannon to capture its prey. With pinpoint accuracy, the archerfish shoots a stream of water from its mouth that can hit its target—such as an unsuspecting insect hanging out on a branch above the water—up to FIVE FEET (1.5 M) AWAY. Forming a tube with its tongue, it squeezes its GILL covers to fire a jet of water. Once the prey hits the water, the archerfish gobbles it up. And just because its weapon is water, it doesn't mean that it isn't forceful. Researchers say if an archerfish's water stream were to hit you, it would sting like a bug bite!

#### If you CHOSE THAT:

The song says Spider-Man can spin a web of any size, but can he spin one as long as two city buses? The Darwin's bark spider can! In Madagascar, BARK SPIDERS

go to work spinning their webs across rivers and streams, attaching them to banks on either side. The largest web found was 82
FEET (25 m) long. The one-inch (2.5-cm)-wide Darwin's bark spider spins silk that

is among the **TOUGHEST** materials found in nature—even stronger than the material used to make bulletproof vests.



### If you CHOSE THIS:

Don't be offended if someone tells you that you run like a mite. In fact, that's a mighty nice compliment! PARATARSOTOMUS MACROPALPIS, a type of mite that lives in Southern California, U.S.A., is the world's FASTEST land animal relative to its size. This sesame seed—size insect can sprint 322 body lengths per second. By comparison, the CHEETAH—which clocks the fastest actual speed of any land animal—moves at 16 body lengths per second. If you were able to run 322 body lengths per

second like a mite, you could run 1,300 miles

(2,000 km) in an hour!

### If you CHOSE THAT:

How's this for an awesome party trick: You can shape-shift so no one can find you. The MIMIC OCTOPUS is an expert at it. Not only can it change colors, the mimic octopus can also impersonate a number of animals, scaring off potential predators.

It can flatten itself to look like a poisonous sole fish, swirl its arms to look like a lionfish, or change colors to look like a venomous sea snake. But it doesn't stop there—this octopus can even CHANGE its texture to match rocks, coral, and plants. Good luck spotting the mimic octopus the next time you go snorkeling!

You'd have to have the memory of, well, a DOLPHIN! With some of the best memories in all of the animal kingdom, dolphins are able to remember other dolphins' whistles DECADES after they hear them. In fact

whistles **DECADES** after they hear them. In fact, dolphins are considered to be one of the most intelligent species on Earth! They even use **TOOLS**; for instance, they carry sea sponges in their beaks to protect them from scrapes on rocks and urchins when checking out the ocean floor.

#### If you CHOSE I HA!:

Watch what you say when you're around an African gray parrot. It might repeat what you have to say! GRAY PARROTS, one of the LARGEST parrots in Africa, don't have the ability to express original thoughts, but they can mimic what they hear. In the wild, they often mimic

the calls of other birds. But in captivity, they are

Because they're mammals, dolphins have to come to the water's surface for air—about every seven minutes. When a dolphin sleeps, only half of its brain nods off; the other half remains awake to breathe and to keep an eye out for danger.

MICHAEL JORDAN, considered one of the greatest basketball players in NBA history, was also one of the greatest dunkers. Jordan made sailing through the air from the free throw line and hanging on the rim a moment later look like child's play. In all, Jordan played 1,072 NBA GAMES and scored 32,292 POINTS! If you didn't get to watch him play before he retired, you might be able to find him on your shoes. The "Jumpman" logo, modeled after his famous dunk, is featured on the basketball shoes that bear his name.

### If you CHOSE THAT:

THREE-TOED SLOTHS that live in the forests of Central and South America use those three long toes to grip branches, which allows them to spend just about all of their time aloft. But they don't move around much while they're in the trees. Sloths move at a rate of about

12 feet (3.7 m) per minute when
they're on the go. The one time

Step into the Doctor Who TARDIS, and you can rematerialize at another point in time on Earth or in another **GALAXY.** TARDIS, which stands for Time and Relative Dimension in Space, is the 1960s-looking London police box bioship that the Doctor uses to travel through time and over distances in the British TV show. Sure, this is all science fiction, but two physicists recently wrote a scientific paper explaining how a real TARDIS could, in theory, operate as a bubble of **SPACE-TIME**, moving backward and forward along a closed loop of time. The only problem: For the concept to work, it requires a certain exotic matter that so far hasn't been discovered. Alas, for now, you don't need to look out for flying police boxes.

> If you CHOSE HAI: Just think what your batting average would be if the ball were being pitched to you in slow motion. **SQUIRRELS** should really be

recruited for the major league. To escape predators, squirrels—along with other small creatures—have evolved to see the world at a slower rate than humans do. That's because they are able to receive a lot of information in a short amount of time. Researchers measured how FAST THE EYES of small animals can **PROCESS** a blink of light. It turns out small animals process light so much faster than humans that, to them, life passes by in slower motion.



#### If you CHOSE THIS:

Imagine being able to SMELL your dinner from a mile (1.6 km) away. Unfortunately, if your sniffer is that good, then you must be a turkey vulture. And if you're a TURKEY VULTURE, then your dinner wouldn't be pizza or a bowl of spaghetti; it may very well be roadkill. Turkey vultures have the best sense of smell of any bird. And they have a particular knack for sniffing out rotting flesh. You've probably seen turkey vultures circling low over open fields or hillsides, probably taking a whiff of a dead animal. Once a turkey vulture has found its meal, other scavengers, such as black vultures, eagles, and ravens, often join in on the feast. Yum!

#### If you CHOSE THAT

**ELEPHANTS** may be Earth's LARGEST land animals, but they are quite sensitive. They're so sensitive, in fact, they can detect danger in their feet! Researchers found that when an elephant stomps its feet, it sends out a **SEISMIC** WAVE that can be detected by other elephants nearly 20 miles (32 km) away. This could be a way that elephants send and receive warnings that there's danger in the neighborhood. Those big elephant ears aren't for nothing, though. Elephants have good hearing, but their ears are also used to cool their bodies by radiating heat from blood vessels—plus, flapping their ears generates a nice cool breeze!


The HAWK MOTH doesn't even need a cape to be one of the fastest flying insects on the planet. This moth has been clocked at speeds over 33 MILES an hour (53 km/h). With narrow wings and thick bodies, the hawk moth is an acrobatic insect—capable of hovering in one place just like a hummingbird. And like the hummingbird, they seek out **NECTAR**, using a superlong proboscis—over a foot (30 cm) long!—to snag pollen from flowers like orchids. Their superhero weakness? A short life span. They only live about a week as adults. Talk about short and sweet!

#### If you CHOSE THAT:

When you're a GALÁPAGOS TURTLE, your superpower isn't your speed. These giant reptiles—which can weigh as much as 500 pounds (227 kg)—chug along at a rate 17 TIMES SLOWER

than you cruise on your walk to school! Yep, there was a reason the hare mocked the tortoise. But where the Galápagos tortoise lacks in giddy-up, it makes up for in longevity. The oldest one on record was over 170 YEARS OLD! Tortoises are among the longest-living animals on the planet—so there's plenty of time to forget any race they might have lost!

If you CHOSE THIS:

Imagine you're a delivery driver, but instead of cruising city streets, your route is the skies of the ALASKAN FRONTIER. Bush pilots carry food, supplies, and mail to isolated areas all over Alaska, sometimes to villages that don't even have roads. They also provide medical evacuation. Alaska has twice the area of any other U.S. state, but it is the fourth least populated. That means the most efficient way to get around is often by small plane! Alaska can have severe weather, and flying through the mountainous terrain is technical. Being a bush pilot isn't easy, but someone has to do it!



#### If you CHOSE THAT

Hold on, it may be a bumpy ride. But what better way to make sure the PYRAMIDS at GIZA are safe and secure than to patrol by camelback? Egyptian guards cruise the area around the 4,500-YEAR-OLD pyramids on dromedaries, which are perhaps better suited for the desert environment than any motorized vehicle. Considered one of the seven ancient wonders of the world and now a UNESCO WORLD HERITAGE site,

the three pyramids were built for three kings of the fourth dynasty. The largest, called the Great Pyramid, built for the King Khufu, was originally 481 feet (147 m)—that's more than one and a half times as tall as the Statue of Liberty.

When you're a RHINO, it's nice to have a little help keeping those hard-to-reach areas clean. Thank goodness for OXPECKERS, eight-inch (20-cm)-long brown birds with striking yellow or red bills. These small African birds cling to the backs of rhinos and other big-game animals—such as elephants and hippos—and nibble ticks, flies, and maggots living there. It's a win-win situation: The annoying insects are kept in check for the rhino, and the oxpecker gets a delicious snack!

#### If you CHOSE THAT:

Good friends pick each other's nits. Now that would make a great T-shirt for a CHIMPANZEE. Chimps—the closest living relatives to humans—

often GROOM one another, picking dirt, dead skin, fleas, ticks, and, yes, lice, out of each other's fur. Scientists say this is an important social interaction for chimps—it creates bonds between family members and keeps things


Quick hands. In the hot seat.

Here's a job that you can really sink your teeth into, or rather, it can sink its teeth into you. SNAKE MILKERS handle deadly snakes in order to collect VENOM that can be used for scientific study. Here's how it works: Snake milkers carefully pick up a venomous snake—a rattlesnake, for example—and press on its head and neck to expose its FANGS. The fangs rest over a collection funnel, and a very small amount of venom is released and stored in a collection tube. The venom is freezedried into a powder and sent to scientists who turn it into antivenom—a medicine that helps people recover from snakebites. It is also studied to treat heart attacks, blood clots, and high blood pressure.

### If you CHOSE THAT:

Be prepared to take some heat on this job. **HOTSHOTS** are elite wilderness firefighters who are trained to respond to fires in remote areas with very little support. There's no sleeping on this job: During wildfire season, Hotshots are on call 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Because crews are often dropped off in remote areas to fight fires, they wear about **40 POUNDS** (18 kg) of gear—including chain saws and shovels—and they wear flameresistant clothing. Hotshots dig trenches, called fire lines, to contain fires and clear away brush from encroaching fire.





During a big STORM, your instincts probably tell you it's a good idea to hunker down inside and wait it out with a nice big cup of cocoa. But if you're a HURRICANE HUNTER, your job is to head into the storm aboard a special airplane that studies weather. Flight METEOROLOGISTS who work for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) travel on turboprop aircraft that can withstand high winds, but the meteorologists have to have stom-



For the casual FISHERMAN, a day of baiting a hook and throwing out a line is the ultimate in relaxation. But if you're a crab fisherman in the Bering Sea, hauling in a catch is no picnic. It's so chilly that ice can form on the boat's deck. If that weren't dangerous enough,

700-POUND (318-kg) crab cages that you haul in can knock you overboard. And talk about seasickness alert: Waves toss boats and relentlessly splash the crew. Occasionally boats will even capsize. Fishermen wear "SURVIVAL SUITS"—waterproof suits that protect them from hypothermia if they get thrown into the sea. Why on earth would you want to be a crab fisherman? There is a payoff: the paycheck. Crab fishermen are well compensated for their hard, dangerous work.

Imagine that your job's uniform is a wet suit, and you are fully equipped with scuba gear. Nope, you're not a scuba instructor or even a coral reef explorer—you're an underwater welder! That's right,

other welding gear, often inspecting and repairing equipment such as offshore oil platforms, pipelines, and ships. Underwater welders are trained in both welding and diving and can only work for a few hours before they need to surface and spend time in a DECOMPRESSION CHAM-

BER. The work is strenuous, but at least you don't have to worry about chatty co-workers!

#### If you CHOSE THAT:







Then they donned protective jumpsuits and dangled from helium-filled balloons, which lifted them up, up, and away. Once at the edge of space, at an altitude of about 25 miles (40 km), these thrill seekers took the plunge, free-falling back to Earth! After navigating the vast darkness of space, jumping from the high dive at the pool might not seem so tough.

If you were an astronaut in the 1970s, you might have had a chance to be a human guinea pig on NASA'S SKYLAB mission. After the Apollo moon landings, the scientists at NASA started to think about ways to test how the human body would deal with longerterm space missions—important if humans were ever to live on Mars. So they built a floating space lab—Skylab. Three different astronaut crews took turns living on the orbiting station, for weeks at a time, undergoing rigorous medical checkups. The result? NASA found that humans could indeed live in what some people call **ZERO GRAVITY**, or more accurately, microgravity. And, as an added bonus, the astronauts were able to work for a long time without getting tired!

But there's a new game in town—private companies such as SpaceX are helping to get payloads into space. It's not just government paper-pushers who get to dream about space exploration. SpaceX has been around since 2002, and in that short time. the company's accomplishments are nothing to sneeze at. It has designed rockets and invented a free-flying spacecraft called Dragon that has delivered supplies (and will soon deliver astronauts) to the International Space Station. Ready to relocate? SpaceX operates from a 4,000-acre (1,600-ha) facility in MCGREGOR, **TEXAS**, **U.S.A.**, and has more than 3,000 employees. See, a little space dreaming isn't so bad after all.

As the craft reached Mars, instead of going into orbit, it burned up in the atmosphere! The mishap was pretty basic: One team of engineers used **ENGLISH UNITS** (such as inches, feet, and pounds) for measurements, and the other used metric—and that's not a good thing during a space mission whose success depends on the accuracy of even the tiniest details.

(ESA) analyzed the comet's atmosphere, they found a foul-smelling mixture that included hydrogen sulfide, formaldehyde, and ammonia, which are all superstinky substances. Why were the scientists sniff-

ing around this comet anyway? The ESA's Rosetta mission visited this SHOOTING STAR to learn about what happens when an icy comet approaches the sun. Scientists believe what they find could give clues to how life may have started right here on Earth. Maybe a little stink is OK after all.

They understand how hard it is to work in microgravity while wearing bulky gloves and a spacesuit that makes you look like the Stay Puft Marshmallow Man!

Lots and lots of objects get left in orbit, from old SATELLITES and abandoned rockets to many smaller things, such as nuts and bolts. 





They tried to send rockets into the sky, but unlike today, there weren't news crews following their every step, and no one was posting about it on social media. In fact, people at the time thought they were a little bit spacey! So the group went to a canyon in the Arroyo Seco, just outside of Pasadena, California, U.S.A., to TEST THEIR ROCKETS. After some early mishaps, including an oxygen line that caught fire and sent flames shooting into the sky, the rocketeers succeeded. Their research laid the groundwork for all American rockets to follow, even though the spotlight missed them at the time!

### If you CHOSE THAT:

In 2012, more than three million people glued their eyes to their computer screens to watch the much anticipated Mars landing of the CURIOSITY ROVER. Since the landing was streamed live,

if anything had gone wrong, everyone would have known about it immediately. Talk about pressure! You can bet the NASA scientists at Mission Control had sweaty palms. Plus, the mission was no walk in the park. First, a parachute slowed the rover when it was about seven miles (11 km) above Mars; then eight small rockets guided the craft until a sky crane could lower it to the ground. The rover, about the size of a MINI Cooper, descended for more than seven minutes. Then it successfully landed in GALE CRATER—and immediately became an Internet sensation!


When you drink water aboard the International Space Station, you're an outstanding **RECYCLER!** That's because 93 PERCENT of the liquids that are generated in space—from pee to sweat—are captured and turned into filtered drinking water! OK, before you get totally grossed out, check out how it's done: Body fluids and even water left over from, say, brushing your teeth, are collected in a distiller that spins to produce artificial gravity and move the wastewater. Contaminants go to the sides of the distiller's drum, and the steam that is left is collected, filtered, and turned into water. The cool thing

about recycling water like this means that humans could, in theory, live for long periods of time away from Earth without needing new supplies of water.


about \$40, which means they aren't an everyday snack food.



Each "gum ball" has eight tentacles that capture plankton and other small bits of food drifting in the ocean currents. While this coral grows in the cold waters of the north Pacific and north Atlantic Oceans, it's located deep down, at depths of 650 to 4,200 feet (200–1300 m).

## If you CHOSE THAT:

Save your maple syrup, these pancakes aren't what you had in mind! You're headed to PUNAKAIKI, NEW ZEALAND on the west coast of the South Island—to see the country's famous PANCAKE ROCKS. These kind of "pancakes" started to form some 30 million years ago under the sea as marine creatures died and fell to the bottom of the ocean. Then, intense pressure from the water and depth turned the critters into solid rock. As the rocks rose above the surface, rain and wind shaped them to look like mom's homemade flapjacks. If you want to see the formations up close, be sure to pack a rain jacket. When ocean water enters caverns below the pancakes at high tide, PLUMES OF SPRAY SHOOT UPWARD between the stacks to douse visitors.

head over to the main reading room. It can hold as many as 1,000 people, which is quite a crowd! The library's collection contains some 15 MILLION ITEMS, including baseball cards and comic books. With reading material in more than 1,200 languages and dialects, and current newspapers from all over the globe, nobody can ever say there's nothing to do in this biblioteca (that's library in Spanish, bub).

Some bistros rescue stray cats, nurse them back to health, and then allow customers to adopt them. Don't worry, there are strict rules protecting the kitties from too much cuddling!



The red mailbox was installed 15 years ago to draw attention to the area when a fair was passing through. It worked: Tourists drop in some 1,500 pieces of mail every year!

Goudier Island, ANTARCTICA, is home to 2,000 gentoo PENGUINS ... and one post office. Why would a tiny, soccer field—size island in Antarctica have a post office? It actually processes 70,000 pieces of mail for more than 100 countries annually during its operating months of November to March, mostly from tourists on cruise ships that flock to the island twice daily. But don't expect the post office to send your mail express! It takes letters anywhere from two to six weeks to be delivered. Scientists on the island study the penguin population, and the black-and-white residents can be seen padding around the post office grounds.



Hawaii's Big Island is, as you might imagine, the biggest of the HAWAIIAN ISLANDS—and it's still growing! Kilauea VOLCANO has been erupting since 1983 and creates enough lava every day to resurface a 20-mile (32-km) two-lane road! Most of that lava has gone straight to the ocean in LAVA TUBES, additional control of the control of the

has gone straight to the ocean in LAVA TUBES, adding new layers to the island. Since it began erupting, 500 new acres (202 ha) have been added to the island's overall square footage! Recently, a new vent formed, and the lava is moving in a different direction. Locals are keeping a close eye on its progress, hoping it doesn't get too close to homes and businesses. But you can blink an eye and not miss too much when it comes to watching Kilauea's lava flow: It moves at a rate of about 15 to 30 feet (5 to 9 m) per hour.

#### If you CHOSE THAT:



GLACIERS may dot the island country of ICELAND, but you can enjoy taking the plunge outside in a toasty swimming pool yearround! Thermal pools are heated naturally by underground volcanic activity. One of the most popular is Blue Lagoon, which is—you guessed it—a brilliant blue, thanks to the MINERALS inside it. People have been bathing in geothermal pools since the time of the Vikings—and a few of those pools still exist. Iceland's placement on the Mid-Atlantic Ridge makes it a superactive volcanic place, and Icelanders have used that to their advantage: Some 85 percent of the country's homes are heated by captured thermal energy.




In about the amount of time that you can hold your breath, you can zip in an elevator to the observation deck of Taipei 101, one of the TALLEST buildings in the world. Located in Taiwan, TAIPEI 101 is 1,670 feet (509 m) tall. Tourists can take a trip up to the observation deck and peek over the edge (behind a guard fence) to check out what's happening on the city streets 1,286 feet (392 m) below. But perhaps more impressive than its height is how fast you travel to the top floors. Pressurized elevators speed along at 38 miles an hour (61 km/h). The shape of the SKYSCRAPER resembles a pagoda, and its sectioned look is inspired by bamboo.

#### If you CHOSETHAT:

Until 20 years ago, the only people who cruised through COSTA RICA'S forest canopy were scientists who wanted to observe the jungle from a good vantage point—and who also needed a quick way to get from Point A to Point B. Today, tour groups offer rides on zip lines, where you can view the forest the same way a monkey does, from the top down. Observation towers can be more than 70 FEET (21 m) high and nearly a half mile (0.8 km) apart, but don't worry: You're strapped in with a harness as you zip between platforms on wires at speeds of 50 miles an hour (80 km/h) or faster!

The number eight is considered lucky in Chinese culture, and the number holds special significance at Taipei 101: The building has eight upward flaring sections, and the whole building is supported by eight columns.

The buzzing was so loud during the soccer

matches, even the announcers shouting "GOOOOOOAAAAL!' couldn't compete. South African soccer fans in the 1990s started playing these horns, which quickly became a way to drown out everything: communication between players, referees, and even announcers. Another score for the fans: The vuvuzela is considered one of the MOST ANNOYING (AND INTENSE) SOUNDS in the world!

The TRIO from Manchester, England, worked with scientists who study the therapeutic aspects of sound to produce this dreamy dirge. So put on your comfy PJs and get ready for some quiet time. The tune's repetition of tones, frequencies, and rhythms encourages a state of super calmness. A study even found that listening to this song is more relaxing than getting a massage. No wonder it's called "Weightless." The song lasts for eight minutes of total CHILL TIME.

Turns out that singing in the school CHORUS is good for more than just perfecting your pitch. Chorus members' hearts beat as one—and not just when they're crooning out love songs. When choir members sing, their heart rates follow the same rhythm, which is guided by the tempo of the song. Researchers think that when singers exhale, nerve impulses activated in the brain cause the heart to beat slower. That means that the SOOTHING SOUNDS of choral groups do a lot more for the singers than just make them sound good—they make them feel good too!

**ROCKING OUT** in the school band does a whole lot more than get you ready for your own *School of Rock* 







for these guys. The musicians use drills and other tools to shape the
instruments, and then they add microphones and pickups to help amplify
the sound. But if you want to start your own veggie band, just make sure

your parents don't need the produce for dinner. PROMISE?









Bundle up in your woolly hat and gloves or this music might just chill you to the bone! In LAPLAND, the most northern region in Sweden, a band of intrepid musicians plays music each winter inside a frozen cave. And they play instruments made mostly of ice: ice-struments. While the concert hall in Luleå, Sweden, is kept at a cool 23°F (-5°C), the sound can be sizzling! Just like ice sculptures, the

instruments are fragile, and even the slightest warmth from your breath can melt them. The violin, for instance, is hung from the ceiling and played with a protective shield covering its thinner parts, which are just 0.12 inches (3 mm) thick.

#### If you CHOSE THAT:

If fire is more your style, this choice is for you! A scientist uses MOUNT ETNA, Europe's tallest active volcano, to create beautiful music. The 10,922-F00T

(3,330-m)-tall volcano located on the island of Sicily in the Mediterranean Sea has been active since at least 1500 B.C. Giving Etna a voice was the brainchild of Domenico Vicinanza, an Italian scientist who turns patterns in the volcano's movements into sound waves using sonification, a process that translates data into musical notes. And when the song's over, you'll want to erupt into applause!

And new research is proving it. A psychiatrist in London looked at 15,000 IDENTICAL TWINS to see how well they could draw. If one identical twin was good at drawing, then the other twin was more likely to be good at drawing as well. Another study looked at identical Swedish twins who played musical instruments but spent different amounts of time practicing. Guess what? The twin who spent more time PRACTICING didn't necessarily play any better than the slacker twin. So while natural talent does play a role in how good you are at something, don't get too excited. As any Olympic medal winner, concert pianist, or famous artist will tell you, they achieved GREATNESS because they practiced a lot!

That's right, this guitar has 42 STRINGS! The Pikasso also has four necks (well, where else would you put all those strings?) and two sound holes. Surprisingly, it's actually pretty easy to hold because it's thinner where it presses up to your body. The guitar was crafted by hand from Indian rosewood, German spruce, and mahogany. So just like a Pablo Picasso painting, this guitar is a real work of art! But remember, it also took some 1,000 hours of work to build it, so if you ever get your hands on the Pikasso, fret carefully!

If you CHOSE THAT:

Making beautiful music without touching your hands to an instrument sounds like crazy talk. But if you're playing the THEREMIN, it'll look just like you are playing the air! The theremin is a musical instrument that uses two metal ANTENNAS to control amplitude (how soft or how loud the sound is) and pitch (whether the sound is high or low). The sounds get louder and softer or higher and lower in pitch as you move your hands closer and farther away from the antennas.

The pilot of this AIRCRAFT never has to leave the ground. That's because this plane is a drone, a type of aircraft that pilots fly REMOTELY. The special drones used by the Air Shepherd Initiative do more that just speed through the clouds. They keep watch over threatened wild-

life in southern Africa by sending live video streams to spotters who can look for illegal activity.

That's really important, because poaching is a huge problem in the region. Some 40,000 elephants and 1,200 rhinos are killed every year; these are dangerously high numbers considering that fewer than 20,000 rhinos remain in the wild. Computer programs help figure out where the poachers might strike next so that the pilots can fly the drones over at-risk areas. And when poachers are spotted, park rangers waiting on the ground rush to the scene to PROTECT THE ANIMALS.








The tradition began in the beginning of the 19TH CENTURY and developed out of a folk dance. A large base of people—usually the strongest and biggest of the group—forms the base of the TOWER. As individuals climb onto the shoulders of others, the tower grows to as high as nine or ten tiers, with fewer people on each tier as they get higher. The human tower can be as tall as a three-story building! Often nimble and light kids make up the very top tier and raise their hands in the air! Judges don't make their award decisions solely on height, they also base their decisions on the complexity of the build.



(Located in northeast China, Harbin isn't far from the Russian border.) Once night falls, the sculptures are illuminated from the inside with colorful lights. While certainly a winter wonderland, don't forget to bundle up—temperatures can get as low as minus 30°F (-34°C)! That's nothing to sneeze at!

Sand castle schmand castle. How about a sand-sculpted woolly mammoth with a little tuft of seaweed on its head? That's the kind of sand art you'll find at the ANNUAL SCULPTURE CONTEST at Point Reyes National Seashore in California, U.S.A. Individuals and groups—including kids—face off to create whatever suits their fancies—from Medusa to an Aztec ruin to a sculpture of a man before he's had his morning cup of coffee. Of course, all good things must end. It's not unusual for the sand creations to get STOMPED on after prizes have been awarded.







In Oaxaca's main plaza, farmers and artisans show off their radish sculptures, of which Maya rulers, Christian religious figures, and local wildlife are often the subjects. Fans of the RADISH ART wait in long lines to pass by the artists' booths to get glimpses of their work. But alas, these sculptures are temporary: They turn brown and have to be tossed after only a few days.

Traditionally, during the time of the Inca Empire, Inti Raymi (Festival of the Sun) was a NINE-DAY CELEBRATION to honor the sun god during winter solstice (when the sun is the farthest from Earth). Today, a festival in Cusco, Peru, honors that 500-YEAR-OLD TRADITION. An

actor portraying an Inca emperor rides in a chariot through city streets, which are filled with music and people dancing. Historically an animal was ceremonially SACRIFICED to ensure good crops, but today that sacrifice is faked.
